So, uh, apologize, we just had a couple of technical issues with the highest capacity and all of those folks joining in a but welcome to immigration voice and our calls on this Wednesday night, August first two. Pretty critical based on all the feedback she's received and some of the developments that have been going on for the past couple of weeks and we intend to capture a and talk about some of the things that have been going on and I'll talk about some next steps, but because we are a, we've just read such a significant milestones and we have a lot of new members joining. I want her to take this opportunity to just provide a brief background on immigration voice. So voice is a national nonprofit organization that is laser focused on uprights for high skilled immigrants. Uh, for the past 12 years we've done thousands of advocacy events across the country and uncaptured that'd be worked with congressional offices on the House and the Senate side and also various administrative officers including the White House.

Speaker 1: [01:15](#) Create awareness about the CVS, quality of life issues faced by legal tax, being high skilled immigrants that are stuck in being cut back, and this is important. It's more particularly that we also advocated about the impact it has on the American worker displacement than wage issues for any immigration legislation that gets blend or introducing progress. Immigration voice is the stakeholder voice that makes sure that the high skilled immigrant community is represented. Our key focus, everyone on this call probably know this, but our key focus on the service side of things has been a simpler technical commonsense fix that eliminated that community or country caps on employment based green cards with the help of a national grassroots movement and a champion Congressman Kevin Yoder. We've just reached a very significant milestone in the journey of this. Then ended legislation. Talk about that and to hear from Indian as well.

Speaker 1: [02:15](#) And the reason we focused on this bill and we continued to do for students that piece of legislation is because you know, regulations and I'm betty temporary bandage and the rate would change. The system is through. Um, it pertains a lot. So with that, you know, pretty on the call we have the resident voice, we have Leon who is our chief counsel, chief strategist from Holland and Knight, and we have hundreds of immigration, Voice Warner, dear so chatted in from across the country, these

other folks who each state chapters and local efforts and you guys know who you are, but we all have to be very thankful for everything these guys do on behalf of the impaired school and begin to come in and do so. Thank you for joining this call as well. Um, but today we're going to go over some key updates based on some of the activity that's been going on in the last couple of weeks.

Speaker 1: [03:10](#) And then we want to take questions. You want to make every question a czar questions coming on telegram and we weren't able to address all of those as well. So let me just quickly, uh, open up Leon and I'm by talking about what happened last week. Um, he tried to do, was part of the DHS appropriations bill. Uh, we put a facebook post out and there was a video where he saw a vision voice members being in dcfs celebrating this moment. The first question is, why was this important? What is the significance of this and why were we sending the yard? Do you want to just provide that opening statement or talking about the significance of what happened last week? Yes,

Speaker 3: [03:53](#) they grow very much and thank you everyone who's on the call. So I want to talk about first what happened. So what happened was, uh, there is so every year and right around this time, the deadline starts to come, which is a separate 30th. Every year the government has to pass what's called a bail that or war on law. What the bill that the president signed it. It becomes a law that says we're going to spend this much money in order to fund the government. This is how much money we're going to give to every government agency each year in order for them to use to do their mission. So there's an appropriation bill, let's say, for the Defense Department and it says the army's going to have \$50,000,000,000 a year to do all that, to do everything it needs to defend America, or there's one for the State Department that says the State Department is going to get 10 billion a year to handle all the embassies and everything else.

Speaker 3: [04:51](#) So there are similarly one from the Department of Homeland Security called the Department of Homeland Security Appropriations film. And what that bill is the bill that pond with Department of Homeland Security. I have a border protection CFA, uh, use as the coast guard, et Cetera. And so because the Department of Homeland Security, my be funded, otherwise it doesn't fund. It cannot exist, but there can be no border patrol. There can be no, I, there can be no use for cetera because that eight be must be funded. We, uh, say this is the perfect opportunity because our bill also affects my security issues to include hr three slash nine slash two in the Department of Homeland Security. Bill, that has been a goal of ours since I

joined. Uh, the immigration theme in January of 2017, we'll talk about why that's succeeded in a moment, but so congressman Yoder who's our champion, and we recently became the head of the vhs committee in the house, added hr three nine tube onto the va, deb appropriations bill.

Speaker 3: [06:12](#) That was an act of extreme political courage, amazing. Moved from Congressman Yoder and we'll talk about a lot of the things that helped get that accomplished, but by doing that now, that is the best I was needed for now. The full house when they come back, the pride, the vhs appropriations sales, and then the idea is that the Senate and the house will work together on a final product and we'll talk about that a little bit more, but that final product, it includes hr. Three, nine means that not only does the Department of Homeland Security gets the money it needs to continue operating with a need, but then our bill hr, three, nine, two pipers along with it, which means that the concrete caps will be eliminated. That's been our goal. That's the objective. And so this was the critical step because if you're not in the bill when it goes to the floor of the house, you're never going to get in.

Speaker 3: [07:13](#) So by getting, by, getting a green on the bill when it goes to the floor of the house for a vote, when they come back from recess, that was a monumental first that if it's not the end, but the beginning of the end at the end of the beginning, but it is like, you know, you take the b both monument, the leopard is the first step, every other step is ours. But if you don't do this first step, you don't get anywhere. And so by having done this first step, which has never, ever, ever been accomplished before, it is a you, a victory both for trying to pass this bill this year, but also for setting a precedent that eight, three, nine, two is associated with the Department of Homeland Security Appropriations process. Edamame. I don't know if you want to chime in with anything and this has been a labor of love. And, uh, you know, just talked about the, uh, the bill. And what it means, but I think you heard us talk about how we got there and like what a Weirido strategy and how this was important as part of the overall strategy.

I will put everybody on the call and I would just like to add that the would not have reached the all the hard work that a lot of people across the country have put in and all the resources that they had boarded and age. I'm away from family time, away from work, taking time off and Blaine to to do the different meetings over the years and to create awareness and education about what this issue is about. Really they should not be discrimination based on the country

and veal. Not the first ones were saying it in every generation. They have been different issues that have the backdrop. Discrimination based on the skin are a language or country of origin and this is a community. Is that a issue for all of our times that which we are trying to address and as I tell everybody who I come in touch with and I talked with Dr that this is not something that 100 people get insulted by themselves, this needs a thousand's of us to get together and collaborate and make it happen. So everybody will look this. Thank you. Thank you. Thank you. And like you know, to express gratitude to everybody who has worked on this for so many years to make a top of no vr on a bill that has passed and hoping that to get done and then before the end of the year,

Our bill was added to bhs appropriation, which this is the one weekend a bursary today from what happened last week. I have spoken to very, and I'm not exaggerating when I say 50, 50, very influential reporters, politicians, the company a who have asked me how did this up? There must be like the Koch Brothers or George Soros or somebody might be behind this effort because it doesn't make any sense. Why would your little bill matter? Why would anyone do that and what they don't realize. Okay. Because they're not in the fight like all of you are every day is immigration voice. I've been around since 2008. And if you look at the, uh, or even earlier, and if you look at the visa bulletin right now, you'll see that the visa board, this was January first 2009 for three.

That means that you've been coming, you know, nine saying this is the harm I have for not getting a green card and old Penn, you know, 11 in Swepco in 13 and 14. 15, 16 and 17. I mean, they see you, you become part of the community. You're talking to the Faberge, your pockets of the members, they, you, I've seen that. They know you when we go around, they, you know, they, they know you, they know who you are. You tell me that you report, you report this to me. Because if members, my friends, etc. Uh, and so what happens is as that currency bills over the course of time, that's why our bill has succeeded. It sUcceeded because at any moment we can activate 20 or 30 people in the district because you're involved and you care and you can go to a meeting immediately and say, hey, we need your help for x, y, and z.

Speaker 3: [12:29](#) And so that's not about me or any strategy I made or amman or anything else. That's because of the people on this call. And so what I've got to say and what we're going to talk about in a minute is we need out to triple whatever you were doing before

we're gonna. We're gonna need a massive effort to get this over the file because when you're the closest to success, that's when the most difficult, uh, opposition starts to develop. And so that's what we're going to need. But that's why we succeeded. and we don't have george soros. We don't have warren buffet, we don't have the koch brothers. Even people say tax tech, doug, say nice things about our bills, but they have 80 different priorities. They have to reform. They have a, they want more eight or feeds. They want more green cards. They have accent, they have lawsuit issue, they've got a billionaire and so yes, they say nice things about our bill, but this is not a, the the effort is being done by immigration boys and the best evidence you can have of that is if you look at my twitter feed and anybody else's twitter feed tuesday of last week, the night before dhs approach, only one person was telling people that something wonderful was going to happen at dea does approach because that was our strategy.

And we report back to everybody that, you know, the other people who are working on this and in the progress. Not that during then congressman, you ordered us showing true leadership and wanting to get this done. And that is what he did, and not to the extent he wanted about immigrant coming in from outside, but then he explained them, they shoot so he understood it really quickly and it only takes an acumen all for some a good policy maker who are district on district 30 issue when we explain it to him that when immigrants come in and then they're stuck with the employers and companies that took serious work at a disadvantage in the marketplace and that and that creates an environment where you americans are discriminated because they may have fewer rights.

Everybody's treated equally. We are not seeking the preferential treatment, but they aren't saying make India or China us. We're saying, aww. Equally based on medic. What this book does is it takes out this concept of the country got, were born out of the evaluation process of green cards and ensures that it makes the system more medic best, which is what president trump wants. And uh, that's why, you know, this is the wright brothers that call this ought to be doing and uh, that wouldn't have happened unless so many of

us would have joined hands and come to the dinner and they'd be just paused and give it back to the company.

But, you know, thank you. Thank you everybody. We'll work on this to make it bring it this far. Even the companies, companies, as you pointed out, do not have this as their proper top priority because they have other ideas of things to do and they're seniors and the and the shoulders are asking for, uh, other competing priorities, which is understandable. But some companies have stepped up and they enrolled in recent months and weeks and the last, the last couple of years. But at the same time this bill would have existed if you not working on the poster. Secondly, tHere's been, what, I'm not going to make this progress made this progress and they, I'm not come this far if it was not for all the, all of us working on this together, so everything is relevant and important as it is, but it is everybody who worked on this and the ebooks are so that, uh, and who agreed to lend us her story, the push for this and push for that. I just necessarily on this and then spending over there digging with the leadership. So I just paused there. I'm giving back to you. Thank you so much. So at this point we have dr mark, you know, few years ago and we'd strategy be running after the court sponsorships and now we

have in the appropriation of spending a pretty significant milestone. I think all of us have to be very proud about what future will not accomplish as a, as a grassroots movement. You can, you talk about what's next, what happens now both in sales. So here are technically technically heres what actually has happened. The bill has to go through the rules committee in the house, which they had a rule how many hours for debate, how many amendments, etc. Then it has to go through the house floor. The senate has already passed a dhs appropriation bill that does not have hr, three, nine, two in it, but that's not a bad sign because the senate has been passing all of its appropriation bills offensively, uh, saying that they're going to basically do the same thing of the year before and so all of these buildings to be conference with the house bills.

And so the point is once the house passed the appropriations bill, then the senate and the house are going to have to come together to decide the hr green nine to stay in the final product or does it not say in the final product. And that's where all of our advocacy as to be focused on is to make sure it stays in the final product. Now, when that will be will depend mostly on president trump. When you hear president trump saying, I might shut down the government over the border wall. What he's saying in actuality is I want the bhs appropriation bill five

before September 30th, or if not, I'm going to shut it down. I'm just kind of agree to a temporary extension till after the election. When he says, well, I might shut it down after the election, which is the other thing he's saying, so that might mean that the conference takes place after the election, but in any case, as long as the president of the fifth thing, one way or another, that's the border wall.

Be fun, david. The only bill that funds his border wall is the house bill. The senate bill does not fund the border wall, and so that means that while they're trying to figure out the compromise about the border wall funding, they will also have to address the fate of hr three, nine, two, and that's why I guess I might as well as the transition into this subject. When we, when we merged the feminine about bill that we need a third, three nights in her house sale, explained to them what it is and I for their support and we need to do this over and over and over and over again this month of august when people are all so that we make it extremely clear that this is a priority.

There's a famous philosopher called john rawls, ra wls, and he has a very interesting point.

You might be in the group with the 70 year back log just for the risk that you might be in the group where there's no backlog. Everyone would say, no, that's not fair because I don't know. I don't know. I have a 50 percent chance of being in the 70 year back log or a 50 percent chance of being a note back log. Let's not do it that way. Let them do it. The fairway, where someone who's in line now get the green card before someone who's not even born yet. And of course that's an obvious point. Why should someone who is not born yet get a green card now over? So you know. So for someone who's been lying now, so it's an obvious point, but one word maybe

I said one way or another he's going to insist on the border wall, which means one way or another there's has to be a bill that passed that will either have a payment or not happen. So those are the two timelines when you got to watch for the president because it's literally all up. The president trump now, thanks to you on. The next question is, um, you know, there's going to be critical for folks to work in the restaurant business.

Literally just went through his bed. Your h one bs been denied. You got to take your child who has down syndrome and autism and he's in a wheelchair. This is about pure survival now and people need to understand that's why it feels desperate that it gets bad now because our survival is at stake.
